Dilemmas of planning, mapping and designing for health and wellbeing: intervention and regulation

The rise of the social dimensions of health has stimulated the spatial professions - architecture, planning and geography. Planning, mapping and designing for health and wellbeing have become priorities for many practitioners and researchers within these professions. Reflecting on both the past and present this seminar opens a discussion on the dilemmas of the agency of the spatial professions in the generation of health and wellbeing. The seminar will briefly introduce and conceptually explore two dilemmas: intervention and regulation. In the practice of planning and architecture for health and wellbeing practitioners face the dilemmas of space and time of intervention and regulation through material norms. The spatial professions need to unpack these dilemmas, navigating their equity, to make these professions more explicitly aware of their limits and potential in addressing health and wellbeing.

Jason is an Associate Professor and a Research Director at the Institute for Sustainable Futures (ISF), University of Technology Sydney (UTS). Jason joined ISF in October 2008, after a three-year engagement as a Research Fellow at the Faculty of Design, Architecture and Building at UTS. Jason received his PhD from the University of New South Wales. As an architect, planner, urban sociologist and legal geographer, Jason's program of research focuses on processes of spatial governance through a range of techniques including law, architecture, property rights, planning, and environmental management. Whilst at ISF Jason has led over 20 research projects on spatial governance in relation to sexuality, religion, health and wellbeing, environmental risk amongst other topics, with a particular focus on how spatial governance influences issues of equity, vulnerability and resilience. The research has been carried out in Australia, France, Italy, People's Republic of China, the United States, Canada and the United Kingdom, and arises through collaboration with national and international research institutions, government, industry, communities, and the spatial professions.

Jason's research has been published widely, in a diverse range of journals including Urban Studies, Environment and Planning A, Journal of Sex Research, Urban Policy and Research, Critical Social Policy, and the Journal of Cleaner Production. He is currently completing a four-volume collection with Professor Carole Cusack (The University of Sydney), titled 'Religion, Sexuality and Spirituality: Critical Concepts in Religious Studies' (Routledge, 2015).
